- 1. Financial Accounting is maintained on Tally. In addition to that office software for generation of pay slip, cheque printing and TDS calculation and submission to Income Tax Department also are used It generates various reports as required from time to time.
- 2. We have a professional agency for processing of exam results and printing of mark sheets which also generates performance reports as required. This agency is responsible

- for maintaining confidentiality and upgrading of system with the changing University rules.
- 3. Administrative tasks are distributed to different sections in the office which looks after maintenance of records of personnel relating to appointment, salary, retirement and all such matters. It is partially digitised as files have to be maintained for inspection by government and University appointed bodies.
- 4. Admission procedure is fully digitised beginning with submission of forms to payment of fees for final admission. College uses its own website to link with a designated bank's payment gateway which automatically transfers funds to the specific accounts maintained with them. Detailed reports of forms submitted can be monitored in real time while payment summary is generated on the same day and other reports on t+1 basis.
- 5. Scholarships granted under government schemes is routed through online submission on government portal which generates the list. Scholarships and concessions provided by the college and nongovernment bodies are routed through the same desk. All related records are available at one place.
 - These procedures constitute the MIS which aids decision making by the concerned authorities in the organisation.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of the year along with individual time tables of teachers. The test schedules, syllabus and academic calendar is uploaded on the website. Academic events like guests lectures and film screening are also well planned by departments at the beginning of each semester. There is an online system of uploading data regarding the departmental events which helps in documentation. Moreover our college magazine Kiran contains all the information regarding academic activities in addition to extracurricular activities.

Past year's papers are stored in the library for students' reference. Some departments have their own library from where students can issue books. Proper attendance records are maintained by Attendance Committee and defaulters are required to give an undertaking saying they will improve their attendance. Every classroom is well equipped with microphone, LCD projector, white and black boards and smart boards. Notice boards on each floor display relevant academic information from time to time. There is also an Academic Planning Board in the College which deliberates and suggests on teaching, learning and evaluation and also co-curricular activities to be organised during academic year. Broad outline of event schedules like exams and tests are also set for the period. The Exam Committee looks into smooth conduct of all exams and timely declaration of results. Many of our teachers are part of university BOS and work as paper setters.

Feedback is obtained from students and employers. The feedback is analysed by IQAC and the Teachers' Awards Committee which looks at areas that need improvement. In case of lacunae in curriculum, Add-on Courses and Bridge Courses are conducted. Field visits are arranged to give the students a feel of industry. As far as teachers are concerned, any major gap in knowledge delivery is brought to the notice of the Head of the Department and resolved. In some cases it is referred to the Academic Planning Board which suggests interdisciplinary modules and innovative teaching methods. Refresher and Short Term courses help in keeping abreast of recent developments. Feedback from employers help in training the students along with hands on experience with use of software etc. The feedback serves as an important indicator of the course of action to be taken. Every program like CPCA and SHP has their own feedback mechanism, which helps them continuously review and revise the modules to keep it relevant.

Mentoring system is followed at F.Y., S.Y. & T.Y. level. Looking at the academic performance of the students, they are grouped for Peer Mentoring and Teachers' Mentoring system. Self financed courses hold Peer Mentoring System where, academically brighter students mentor the weaker ones. In this way both the groups of students have a win-win situation. Brighter students gain confidence and weaker students can be more open with their peers. In Teachers' Mentoring, all the students are divided into groups and each teacher mentors a group of students. The teacher meets her assigned group of students several times during the year. He/she understands the students' difficulties at both personal and academic level. Students are guided by teachers to make a study schedule by themselves and are advised how to study a difficult topics. Career guidance is also imparted.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

As per University regulations, in 2017-2018, continuous internal evaluation system is only for final year students. Internals are for 25 marks which includes a test and class room participation. Tests are held for all T.Y. students as per time-table prepared by the Examination Committee. Internal component of 25/100 marks continues for self-financed students and has been revised from 40/100. The Foundation Course subject has a component on project presentation for 25 marks which is on a continuous basis.

In addition, teachers conduct class tests and quizzes on a regular basis. Class room lectures also include revision tests, both oral and written.

The unaided courses have projects and internal tests are conducted on a regular basis as per time table prepared in the beginning of the year.

Self-financed courses like B.Sc.(IT) course and Biotechnology have a practical component of 50 marks and internal test of 25 marks.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters

Since 2016-17 the University has started conducting exams for all students (all semesters) and they are held as follows:

Regular exams are held in November for semester I/III/V and in April for semester II/IV/VI. ATKT exams are held in the month of October and March.

The University generally releases the exam schedule around September. However when the academic calendar is made, we keep in mind the examination dates and do not hold any activity in those months.

A number of committees have been formed to look into various activities of the institution. Each committee functions under a coordinator who along with other members is empowered to take decisions and undertake activities. Each department functions independently under its own Head of Department. Departments intimate the administration about problems/ issues which get resolved by them. IQAC of the college also has independent external members on the committee who provide useful feedback and suggestions which are then implemented. Many departments of the college organise seminars and workshops in collaboration with outside agencies such as banks, private organisations and Non Governmental organizations. For e.g. The Department of Hindi organised a national level conference in association with EXIM Bank. The Department of History organised a Five Day workshop on "Revisiting Gandhi" in the Sesquicentennial Birth anniversary of Gandhi and Kasturba, in association with the NGO, Sewagram Collective, TATA Trust and Bajaj Group.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Curriculum Development

Teachers of the institution are members of the Boards of Study of different subjects in the University. They are also members of Boards of Study of different subjects in Autonomous institutions. Teachers consult students, colleagues, industry participants and other stakeholders and carry the suggestions to the BOS where they are implemented whenever the curriculum is updated.

Teaching and Learning

There has been an enhanced use of ICT in pedagogy. Teachers are increasingly using presentations, educational software, films and documentaries to impart learning. Departments are also conducting seminars and workshops and inviting resource persons of great repute to the institution so as to provide a wider knowledge base to the students.

Students are encouraged to use different learning programs by the teachers. Experiential learning is sought to be imparted by conducting field visits and industrial visits.

* Examination and Evaluation

Under the University of Mumbai, a completely new online evaluation system called On Screen Marking(OSM) was started at the final year level. The institution was made a center for OSM and all its teachers evaluated their papers in a dedicated computer laboratory of the College. At the first and second year level the College has ear-marked a central assessment headquarter where all teachers conduct the respective evaluation. However, flexibility is given to teachers for evaluation. The Examination Committee of the college ensures smooth conduct of all examinations. The results are outsourced to a reputed outside agency which ensures timely publication of results.

* Research and Development

The college is a hub of research hub for students and teachers researchers. Five departments of the College - namely Microbiology, Life Sciences, Statistics, Chemistry and Biotechnology have been awarded the STAR Scheme for colleges by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India, hence each department conducts many research related activities throughout the year. The college has also received a grant under DST-FIST by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, hence enhanced research activities are conducted for the Post-Graduate courses of the Science stream. Apart from these the college has dedicated research oriented specialised Certificate programmes like the Science Honors Program (SHP) and Certificate Programme for Commerce & Arts (CPCA), which is conducted for Science and Commerce and Arts students respectively. These programmes are one to one and a half years in duration in which each student takes up a research project under the guidance of a teacher mentor. Research methodology is inculcated in students and they present their research findings before external evaluators. Teachers publish their research papers in national and international peerreviewed journals. Teachers are also encouraged to present their research papers in conferences and seminars. A few teachers have also presented papers and research posters at international conferences.

* Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Every year the college infrastructure is renovated and the needs are addressed. A Fire Riser System was installed in the College. There was a problem with potable water in the college. New water pipes were laid and Municipal Corporation's potable water is now being supplied to the College. The Professors' Common Room and the Girls' Common Room were renovated. Furniture of the college was also refurbished. A number of new books and online resources were added to the library.

Human Resource Management: Teachers are regularly sent to take part in Orientation, Refresher and Short Term courses as per the requirements. The IQAC of

the college also conducts a number of training programmes for teachers as well as non-teaching staff throughout the year. Teacher recruitment is also conducted as per and when required. Even if the University does not grant approved posts to the college, qualified teachers are recruited on contractual appointments to ensure that lectures are conducted smoothly.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration- The Placement Cell of the college actively collaborates with industry so as to carry out placement drives in the college. Several reputed companies visit the college to recruit students from sciences, Information Technology and Computer Sciences streams. Apart from these, the College is well associated with companies and organisations who collaborate with different departments to conduct meaningful lecture series and conferences. Many industry leaders are invited to the college as Resource Persons and they interact with students and share their experience.

Admission of Students:

The admissions of students were conducted online. The regular system of admissions was also carried out. Online admission system was enabled on the College website and students registrations for admission was conducted smoothly. The admissions' lists were all displayed on the College website and the entire admission process was streamlined.

6.2.2 : Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:

- * Planning and Development –There is an Academic Planning Board that meets in the beginning of each term and prepares the academic calendar of each department. This is then put up on the College website for all to see and plan accordingly.
- * Administration- The College administration functions under several committees which maintains all e-copies.
- * Finance and Accounts All finances, accounts and other financial details are maintained using software programmes such as MS Excel, Tally, MS Word, Sensys Easy Pay and Sensys Easy TDS.

- * Student Admission and Support Students' admission and registration is made online on the College website. The Merit Lists are also displayed on the College website. Academic calendar, course structure, syllabi, students' facilities etc are all displayed on the college website and are updated regularly.
- * Examination- The examination circulars, exam ordinances and exam timetables are all displayed on the college website.

6.3.5 Welfare schemes for

The institution has a number of welfare schemes in place for its stakeholders:-

- 1. Best Practices in place for all **staff and students** are:
 - a. Every member of the non-teaching staff donates one day salary towards a retirement beneficial fund that is bestowed upon the non-teaching staff on retirement.
 - b. The institution gives a cup of tea free and lunch at heavily subsidized rate to the non-teaching staff each day. The laboratory staff is provided with a cup of milk and banana each day.
 - c. All non teaching staff are taken an educational cum entertainment trip to another town/city each year. The entire cost of the 3-4 days trip is borne by the institution.
 - d. A "Path Pedi" scheme in the form of cooperative credit society is run for the Non-teaching as well as teaching staff who benefit periodically on the returns of their investment. An office to run the "Path-Pedi" scheme has been provided by the institution.
 - e. A doctor from the Apollo Hospital comes to the college once every week to look after the medical needs of all teachers, non-teaching staff and students. A health camp is organized and a doctor is available for staff consultation.
 - f. 2 sets of Uniforms are provided free of cost to Class IV employees.
 - g. A group medical insurance scheme of "Med claim" instituted by the college is in place for all Non-teaching staff. A number of non-teaching staff members have benefitted from it. A Group Insurance Scheme exists for students.
 - h. The institution has organized the service of 3 counsellors, Personal Counsellor and Career counsellor for the benefit of all students.
 - i. The institution contributes towards one Lunch to the Non-Teaching Staff as well as the Teaching Staff, every year.
 - j. The institution has organized a number of scholarships in collaboration with private donors for its economically backward students every year. SC/ST/OBC students are

encouraged to apply for scholarships from State Government and Central Government.

k. The institution gives admission to wards of teaching and non-teaching staff.

As a part of street culture, street play, "Ek kadam Swachchhta Ki Or" was performed at Eros, Oval Maidan, and Saphale Railway Station. The volunteers went one step forward and cleaned Saphale Railway Station and our Chemistry Lab in the Campus.
