He spoke about the intricacies of research, challenged students to think out of the box and drew their attention towards exploring a plethora of research avenues easily accessible to them.

A total of 16 presenters from various colleges presented their work on topics as diverse as 'impact of Artificial Intelligence on human rights' and it's legal implications; a study of love languages, quality of relationship and relationship satisfaction to Rehoming Ghosts: Specters of Unease in Mumbai's SRA societies besides many others. Presenters were awarded certificates for their participation.

National Webinar Series

The first of the two day Webinar in this series was held on 15th and 16th June. The two day webinar engaged with questions of doing qualitative research during a pandemic and the challenges associated with the same.
